Every month, TSAG would like to shine the spotlight on our First Nations water/wastewater operators who are working diligently to provide safe drinking water to their community and protect local environments through proper management of wastewater effluent! This month we are featuring Ryan Badger from Sucker Creek First Nation.

Ryan operates a recently upgraded water treatment plant that now utilizes state of the art Nano filtration and UV disinfection processes. Ryan is certified to level one in water treatment, water distribution, wastewater treatment, and waste water collection. He is currently prepping for his level II water treatment certification, which is the last certification level Ryan requires to reach full certification for his community's water system.

Some of Ryan's day-to-day tasks on the job include: maintaining and operating his water and wastewater system, repairing and replacing equipment when needed to keep things running smoothly, and completing daily lab tests to ensure the systems are functioning properly and that the drinking water being produced is always safe for his community. Ryan says that one of the things he enjoys most about being a water and wastewater operator is how the industry changes as new equipment and processes are updated or improved. He would also like to mention to anyone considering a career in water and/or wastewater, that there are many opportunities in this field of work!

OPTION 1 CLASSROOM PRESENTATION

Grades 4-6 or 7-12 (year round, indoors)

30-40 minutes

Introduction to watersheds, watershed stewardship and conservation, and drinking water health using a watershed model. The presentation gets students thinking about threats to drinking water quality, potential careers in water, and the importance of water protection, treatment, and conservation.



OPTION 2 MODIFIED WATER FIELD DAYS

Grades 4-6 or 7-12 (year round, indoors)

1.5-2 hours

Introduction to watersheds, watershed stewardship and conservation, and drinking water health using hands-on educational materials. Students learn about watersheds and threats to drinking water health using a watershed model. The students then perform some basic water chemistry tests and learn about the aquatic insects that are used to monitor the health of lakes and rivers. The presentation gets students thinking about threats to drinking water quality, potential careers in water, and the importance of water protection, treatment, and conservation.

OPTION 3 WATER FIELD DAYS

Grades 7-12 (April-October only, outdoors)

Half day or full day available

Our wafer field day's get youth out on the land at a local stream or lake. The day begins with an introductory talk about watersheds, water health, environmental monitoring, and careers in water. The students then spend the day creating site diagrams, conducting water chemistry tests, and completing an aquatic insect survey to assest the health of the local waterbody.

TSAG INFORMATION BOOTH

Short information sessions that focus on promoting source to tap drinking water protection and awareness, including water treatment, water conservation, careers in water safety and watershed health. This booth is an ideal setup for events such as Cultural Camps, Science Fairs, and Career Fairs.



FIRE PREVENTION PRESENTATIONS

Our fire prevention presentations are offered indoors, year round. **Suggested time: 45-60 minutes.**

PRE-SCHOOL/KINDERGARTEN

How to be safe around hot things, matches and lighters, fire and home escape basics.

GRADE 1-2

How to be safe around matches and lighters, how to stop and cool a burn, how to plan a home escape and call emergency services.

GRADE 3-5

Fire safety review, home fire hazards, and reporting an emergency

GRADE 6-7

Fire safety review, fire myths vs. realities, responsible use of fire, fire extinguisher use

GRADE 8-12

Cooking and fire safety, fire and the law, careers in fire services

GRADE 10-12/ADULT

Fire myths and realities, overview of home fire safety, fire extinguisher use
