### **Lesson Overview**

This lesson provides instruction on the 4 degrees of burns and how to treat them. Students are asked to investigate burn hazards in their homes and create burn prevention strategies for their homes.

45 minutes

### **Fire Safety: Fire Protection**

### **Workshop Objectives:**

### Students will:

- 1. List and explain differences between the degrees of burns.
- 2. Explain the treatment for all degrees of burns.
- 3. Note potential burn hazards in their homes and community.
- 4. Create burn prevention strategies.

| <ul> <li>Topics to Discuss with your Class:</li> <li>We have talked a lot about fire prevention and safety over the last few months, and last month about fire fighters and how they are there to help people. Today we are going to look at burns, burn treatment, and burn preventions. First though, let's review what we learned last month.</li> </ul>   |              |
| <ul> <li>Ask the class:</li> <li>What inspires you about our local firefighters?</li> <li>What do you find the most interesting thing that a fire fighter does?</li> <li>Why would you want to be a firefighter?</li> <li>Why would you choose a career in firefighting?</li> <li>What do you think makes you most suited to this career?</li> <li>Topics to Discuss with your Class:</li> <li>Despite fire prevention and safety measures, people can still get burns in day to day living, so let's take a look at what we can do to prevent that.</li> </ul> |              |
| Burns and Burn Treatment  |              |
| Ask the class:  ➤ What do you know about burns?  ➤ How do you treat a burn?  Topics to Discuss with your Class:  • Burns are classified according to the "degree" of burn a person has or how much of the skin has been damaged.  |              |
| Class Activity:  1. Show and discuss the PowerPoint slides from 2 to 6 and discuss as per speakers notes.   |              |

2. Show slide 7. After each bullet stop and ask the students what that fact tells them.

### Ask the class:

- What does this tell you about where most burns might occur? (the kitchen and bathroom) How could these burns occur?
- Where are some other areas where people, especially children might get burns and how would this happen? (living room)
- > What do you think is the bottom-line problem here?
  - ✓ Lack of information and awareness of how to prevent burns

### **Concluding Activity**

### **Class Activity:**

- 1. Set the students into groups: living room, bathroom, and kitchen. Ask them to create a chart of burn dangers in each room and then create as many burn prevention rules as they can for those burn dangers.
- 2. Show slide number 8 for some ideas on how to construct their danger/prevention charts.
- **3.** Ask for a student volunteer from each group to collate just the prevention strategies into a Word document and submit them to you.
- **4.** You can then create one document with all the strategies and print it for the students.

### **Take Home Activity**

### **Topics to Discuss with your Class:**

- 1. We have talked a lot about how fire safety is everyone's responsibility.
- 2. Burn safety is also everyone's responsibility. When you know something that could prevent injuries or death you are responsible to do something.
- 3. Over the next two days you need to go through your house and the house of one elderly person in your community and note all burn hazards and demonstrate how to prevent those burn hazards.
